Principal's Message

Dear Parents and Carers

Welcome to Week 8 with this being the second last eNewsletter for 2020.

This has been an incredibly busy term and the last few weeks are probably the busiest of any time in our school calendar. Staff are extremely busy finalising reports and winding up the 2020 academic year.

Planning has already commenced for 2021 with staffing, class movements and room allocations. At present, we will be commencing the 2021 school year with 27 classes. Our numbers need to be closely monitored and classes will more than likely be temporary for the first few weeks of the New Year. There will be a few new faces at our school in 2021.

An expression of interest has been sent out to all schools for the Relieving Principals position for the beginning of next year. It is hoped by next week, we will know the successful candidate who will be our Relieving Principal until the substantive principal is announced later in 2021. The school is very committed to ensuring that our school plan will continue to move forward.

Skoolbag has become a little problematic of late especially with the latest upgrade. Sentral has the option of having a parent portal and we are asking all parents to go to the application store on their smartphone and download the "Sentral for Parents" app. Parents should have received an email with a **family key** this week which will allow parents to access information pertinent to their children. Over the coming two weeks, we hope to add more features to this

but in the meantime, we will be ensuring that both Skoolbag and Sentral will be issuing all notifications. We anticipate some teething issues and we will ensure we keep you updated. If you have already logged on, you will need to go to:

The additional features will now be displayed.

COVID protocols continue to be in place for the remainder of this school year. With the end of year functions commencing soon it will be a little bit disappointing for parents not to be on site, however, being a larger school this creates difficulties. We need to ensure best practice and safety and are sympathetic to concerns.

Kindergarten normally have an end of year assembly whereby children receive their graduation certificate. This is a beautiful but simple assembly and the children will be going home with a photo taken and their certificate to proudly show their parents. This assembly will be held under the Basketball COLA. We will ensure that Facebook has a number of photos to record this milestone.

Deputy Principals' Message

Ways to Celebrate Your Child's Accomplishments

It's that time in the year again where reports are soon to be given out and end of year awards are being nominated. Regardless of your child receiving one of these awards, it's always great to celebrate those moments in your child's learning journey, to help build their self esteem and confidence to become the best version of themselves as a learner. Here are some ideas that you may already be doing or may want to introduce into your family households. As adults we appreciate words of praise from our employer that acknowledges a well-executed project or job. As we know, kids love to celebrate their accomplishments. As parents, the challenge is how to celebrate children's successes without going overboard. From learning all their spelling words for the week to having a great week at school, there are lots of achievements worth celebrating as a family.

Here are five simple ways to celebrate life's smaller victories and bigger moments:

1. Take time.

Fitting in a "celebration" may seem impossible or even get forgotten in the chaos of a week. That's why it is important to acknowledge an accomplishment as soon as possible. Giving your full, undivided attention to a child is often what he or she is seeking. That, and a hug, can go a long way toward celebrating life's small (and sometimes big) moments.

2. Tell others.

Instead of sharing your children's achievements with others on Facebook and Instagram, are there other people your children would like to share their accomplishments with? Texting a picture or FaceTiming with family may be a better option than social media. Words from Grandma and Grandpa about good grades are fun to hear, and FaceTiming with them about a good week at school acknowledges the accomplishment and keeps them informed of all the positives.

3. Display it.

Depending on their ages, displaying children's work or awards is a way for them to feel that their accomplishment is worthy of being viewed. Buy a set of inexpensive plastic frames that can be used as a rotating display of pictures and awards. The kitchen refrigerator is always a place people go, which makes it the perfect spot for putting up photos of events, report cards, and artwork that makes your child proud. A chalkboard in a high-traffic area can be your family headline board, announcing a child's accomplishment like a news flash!

4. Pick the meal.

Getting the chance to be the mealtime decision-maker can be a special treat to celebrate an accomplishment. Whether it's an ice-cream treat, dinner at a favourite local restaurant, or a favourite meal at home followed by a family movie or game night, your child will enjoy the opportunity to choose the celebration.

5. Physical rewards.

While there is much controversy about giving a gift or money to children as a reward, there are circumstances in which it can be a way to celebrate hard work. Good weeks at school can mean money in the bank for holidays time. If the physical reward helps them to keep achieving, it also helps to celebrate the accomplishment.






