Developing Positive and Respectful Relationships

Developing positive and respectful relationships is an important part of a student's emotional and social development. The relationships in a student's life, including those with friends, family and peers, can influence their physical health, promote self-esteem and assist them in developing a sense of belonging. Teaching students about positive and respectful relationships encourages them to reflect on their current relationships and supports them as they form new ones.

Creating a culture of respect in the school environment requires that students understand their roles and responsibilities (your job – my job). This will help them to identify and nurture healthy relationships and avoid unhealthy ones. They can also be taught that it's okay to speak up and seek help when necessary, which will equip them to negotiate and strengthen their relationships throughout their lives. When students identify and understand the qualities of healthy relationships, such as trust, personal safety, respect, honesty, acceptance and loyalty, they can confidently establish and maintain positive and respectful relationships.

Communication skills are an essential part of managing relationship difficulties. By learning how to recognise and express their emotions and feelings, students are equipped to discuss and resolve issues that are impacting on their relationships with family, friends and partners. By directly discussing issues such as gender stereotypes, abusive behaviour, and discrimination, students can explore a range of qualities and characteristics that promote and develop empathy, resilience and inclusivity. These qualities form the foundation for the establishment of positive and respectful relationships in students' lives.

Crossing the Curriculum

Last week we looked at the language of multiplicative thinking and the importance of students using this language and understanding the connections between representations, situations and concepts. Our school continues to have a strong focus on multiplicative thinking. Teachers are now implementing 'Learning Talks' within the classroom using the language from the Mathematics syllabus. These conversations with students are used as a powerful tool for both teaching and learning. Rich discussion supports our students in making sense of complex ideas and supports rich, meaningful classroom discussions in mathematics. Students continue to build their knowledge in developing efficient numeracy strategies in working flexibly with an extended range of numbers that are suitable for their stage of learning. I have included the language of multiplicative thinking from the syllabus that supports conversation in our Learning Talks.

Wellbeing Matters

Although experts agree that no single factor directly causes children to act aggressively, numerous studies suggest that exposure to <u>violent media</u>, <u>such</u> <u>as content contained in some video games</u>, is a risk factor for violent or <u>aggressive behaviour</u>. While exposure to violent media is only one of several risk factors, it is one that parents have control over. There are so many great benefits to media and technology, including the potential to teach valuable skills. Doing research about TV shows, movies, or games before your kids watch, play, and interact with them will go a long way in helping them avoid inappropriate content.

As a parent or carer, you are the best person to talk with your child about which video games are ok for them to play. Some games contain strong, realistic and graphic violence. This violence may upset, harm or disturb young children because they are not developmentally ready to be exposed to it. Here are some tips to help you and your child decide what video games are appropriate for them.

- Check the classification rating: Australian classification laws require that video games must be classified before they are sold and must display classification markings. Games vary in their level of violent content and may contain themes, language and images that are unsuitable for your child. These markings will provide you with information about the strongest content in the game. Visit www.classification.gov.au to check a game's rating, read reviews and talk to other parents and carers. The Australian Classification Board also has useful information on violent video games to help parents and their children decide what video games are appropriate for them.
- **Be informed and involved**: Having an interest in your child's video gaming can help you decide if the games they are playing are suitable for them.

Ask your child what games they are playing or watch them while they play. Even better, play a game with them. Ask them questions like, 'what is the game about?' and 'Why would you like to play it?' Understanding their motivations will help you identify alternatives to unsuitable games if necessary. Before downloading or buying a game for your child, do some research to decide if it's suitable for your child. Review sites can also be a good source of information about age appropriate content – check out the

<u>Australian Council on Children and the Media, Kiwi</u> <u>Families</u> (NZ), <u>Common Sense Media</u> (US), <u>Parents' Choice</u> (US) and <u>Ask About Games</u> (UK).

- Use parental controls: These are available for Android and Apple phones, as well as tablets and all major consoles to help you manage what content your child is able to access on all the devices in your house. You can set parental controls to limit your child's access only to games that have been given lower classifications (eg G or PG rated games). Explain to your child why you don't want them playing certain types of games. Let your child know that as they get older, these controls can be reviewed and changed. - **Stay involved:** Continue to talk regularly with your child about their gaming interests, who they are playing with and what they play online. Help them understand the risks. Monitor and supervise what your child is playing and encourage your child to tell you if they experience anything that worries them or makes them uncomfortable. 




